Application Process

- Understand the sum of money needed by each school
- Some schools have the ability to fundraise
- Is there a way to leverage multiple schools in the same neighbourhood to increase the capacity and/or to stretch available funds further by engaging multiple schools within a neighbourhood?
- Are there any interested community partners that are willing to collaborate?
- Three main questions aiming to address how applicant would use Wayfinding Signs to help promote Active School travel in their school:
 - 1. What communication would you have with the parents/kids/community?
 - 2. How would you encourage more children to participate in Active School Travel?
 - 3. How you will integrate Education and Encouragement for the use of wayfinding signs and what are the potential impacts?

Sean - Fairly straightforward, great length wise

Kalyn – Do we know what capacity school Public Health Nurses will have to support the project?

Andrew – Hopefully will have the answer to this in the next week

Andrew – We need more capacity from the health units

Kalyn – What role do the Public Health Nurses play in this process?

Andrew – For the application process, some nurses may complete the application for the schools

Andrew – We do now know what the capacity for PHNs will return to

Andrew – Application forms will be online and email contact will be provided if assistance from a team member is needed

Kaylyn – Can we still move forward in the absence of the support from the health units?

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Andrew – We can continue this conversation until the wider team is here

Andrew - Will change language in the application form and focus on providing support from ASRTS team referring persons to our email address

Framework for evaluating responses received:

- Three elements that participation will be evaluated based on:
 - Socioeconomic Status more likely to get applications from higher income schools. Aim is to reach out to other schools that will fit into the high needs, low-capacity bracket.
 - High percentage of children eligible to walk to school
 - Walkability low walkability will make this element more important

- Variables/metrics to be used to measure SES:

- o Percentage of children in LICO
- Immigration status
- Proportion of single parent households
- o Percentage of population without school diploma

- Percentage of children eligible to walk to school

o STS Bus Data

Andrew – We want to ensure there is at least 50% of children that are eligible to walk to school. Funds will be given to the school whereby students have the greater ability to walk

- Walkability:

- Street trees
- o Sidewalks
- Multi-use paths
- Connectivity
- o Density of major roads

Potential Impacts of program:

- Considerations:

- How will the program affect access to walking for kids?
- o Positive impacts that enhance health equity
- Negative effects that contribute to/maintain/strengthen health disparities
 The probability of the predicted impacts

The severity and scale of impact Immediate of latent impacts

 Will some people/communities benefit more the program than others?

Criteria for Awarding Wayfinding Signs

Andrew - Focus in the past has been on high income schools and those with greater capacity

Andrew - Lots of the money invested by the city in STP has gone to higher income schools

Andrew - Aim is to distribute funds more equitably

Andrew - Lower income neighbourhoods tend to have lower walkability and will require the Wayfinding resources

Kalyn – My only concern is that in previous years, there has been a requirement to have a large parental involvement. Families that have lower total family income are less likely to have time to commit to and volunteer in parent associations. By removing that as a mandatory requirement for the application may provide more options for schools, thus increase the capacity of support for parents. This will ensure school inclusion

Andrew – if a school is a willing to pay for the all the signs on their own, we will be happy to have them

Evaluation

Evaluation framework touchpoints:

- 1. Evaluation: every applicant will receive a 3-question survey to provide feedback
 - Basic questions
 - Level of difficulty
- 2. Monitoring: what impact has been made?
 - o 3-month update
 - o Is the \$10,000 investment worth it?
 - Develop data collection methodology
- 3. Dissemination
 - Develop recommendations to share with the community

Molly – Is it just Wayfinding signs? Is there any integration of bike racks in schools? Or is anything walking school bus related?

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Andrew – Aiming to find out what applicants are aiming to do conjunction with the Wayfinding signs

Andrew – Wayfinding signs on their own do not have any impact, without any promotion or implementation of school activities.

Andrew - Campaigns on walking to school days, safety education and bike training that are available to schools if they schools are interested

Sean – How many potential schools can be done?

Andrew - \$10,000 is available. Dependent on how far it can stretch. We also have funds in the committee bank account, so if there are applications outside of London then internal funding must be found. Aim is to have the greatest impact on the greatest number of schools, money permitted

Sean – Identify potential schools and educate them on the potential advantages of the project.

Andrew – we are more likely to get applications from the usual schools

5 Discussion: ASRTS Pilot & HEAL STP Evaluation (Andrew)

- HEAL is currently doing a pilot study that is evaluating our School Travel Planning survey tools
- Parent and Youth Survey
- Conducting interviews with parents and youths throughout the month of June
- Aim is to interview 100 parents and youths
- Interviews are 1 hour in length
- \$35 gift card incentive
- Purpose:
 - Understand whether evaluation tools have face validity – are questions being interpreted the way we want them to
 - Understand whether the evaluation tools have construct validity
- Interviewed 64 participants (parents and youth)

Andrew- if anyone has a link to families and wants to send the information out this will be helpful.

Andrew – Do not have ethics approval for the Public school board

Kalyn – Will reach out to contacts at the YMCA

Andrew will distribute both the parent and youth surveys allowing for the provision for feedback

Graham – Will touch base with Terry

Jenn – Did you try the Boys and Girls Club? YMCA?

Andrew - Yes

Parent Survey:

- Characteristics of Participants
- School Travel Planning question
- Mode of Travel
- Participants have the ability to provide information for all children attending a particular school
- Independent Mobility questions asked
- Barriers to Active School Travel questions
- Facilitators to Active School Travel questions
- Travel Behaviour Attitudes
- Mapping areas of concern
- Youth Survey is similar, the only difference is a road safety knowledge section

Sean – Are there any issues pertaining to distribution

Andrew- completed 44 surveys, 10 booked, 6 tentative

Andrew- Will have difficulties recruited the remaining 25 persons

Andrew – Lots of middle-income households participating. There is not enough diversity.

Kalyn – would doing direct emails to the neighbourhood resource centers be helpful?

Andrew - Yes

Kalyn – What about family centers?

Andrew - They all received it as well.

Graham – Will touch base with Terry

Andrew – There is money set aside for translation through ARSTS funds to increase accessibility

Kalyn – Is language a deterrent? Is there a way to promote that the survey will be available in other languages?

Andrew- We do not have the staff availability. Interested in participants where English is not their first language

	MTO Public Outreach and Education Office Updates	
	- The Moving Ontarian's More Safety (MOMS) Bill received Royal Accent on June 3, 2021. MOMS legislation will combat street racing/stunt driving and aggressive and unsafe driving on our roads. The legislation also includes measures to protect vulnerable road users, such as pedestrians and highway workers, improve truck safety, and strengthen provincial oversight of the towing sector.	

- The 2020 Road Safety Achievement Awards (RSAA) application/nomination papers will be going out by the end of June. We are looking at a few dates in the Fall to announce winners. It will be a digital ceremony.
- The POEO will be transitioning the grants program to an online stream of the Transfer Payment Ontario Network (TPON). The online electronic application process will increase access to non-profit road safety groups across Ontario. The next opportunity will open for one month at the end of June. if anyone has questions or needs assistance with the process, you can contact POEO@ontario.ca or call Phone: (437) 243-8514
- \$200,000 to be used for road safety programs
- Currently working on several e-toolkits that will give our partners shareable road safety resources in a new and dynamic format. Speeding and Aggressive and Vulnerable Road User Toolkits will be available soon.
- MTO's Public Outreach and Education Office completed this survey biennially since 2011, with the exception of 2019. The survey covers a broad range of road safety issues. The focus is on capturing changes in road users' behaviours and attitudes; rather than uncovering what drives attitudes or behaviours
